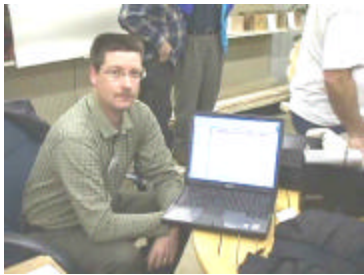

Jeff finished it 2 days after Gracie was born.

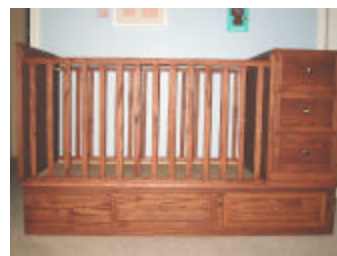
Membership Renewals

Lyman Frugia brought a bowl turned by one of his students and a mesquite 'mini bowl' trimmed with a dark colored wood.

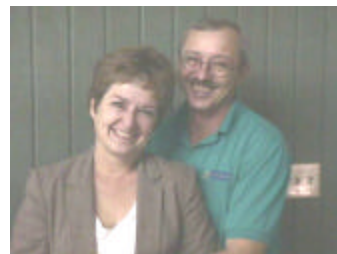
Acadian Hardwoods

Wood Dust Officially Added to the Human Carcinogen List

The federal Department of Health and Human Services has added wood dust to its list of "known human carcinogens."

The department's biennial Report on Carcinogens listed wood dust based on evidence that long-term exposure increases the risk of cancers of the nasal cavities and sinuses. The Report itself has no regulatory impact, although it may prompt legislative action.

Wood dust was one of more than a dozen substances added Dec. 13 to the government's official list, which now totals 228 substances linked to cancer. Other new additions include steroidal estrogen, broad spectrum UV radiation produced by the sun and artificial sources, and beryllium.

Wood dust's addition to the report came as little surprise. The National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences, which advises the department's National Toxicology Program, had voted unanimously to recommend adding wood dust to the carcinogen list two years ago. The NTP generally accepts NIEHS' recommendations.

The Inter-Industry Wood Dust Coordinating Council, a group joining more than 20 wood products associations, is funding a six-year study on wood dust exposure effects. The \$2 million study, being conducted by Tulane University, involves 3,000 woodworkers at 10 plants.

For your health's sake, you should always wear dust protection when you're in the shop. Any type of mask will provide some protection. But

I prefer the 3M Easi-care mask. It's light, certified for paint fumes, pesticides and dusts. I use a fresh mask when I spray lacquer. When the vapor absorption cartridge is spent, I continue to use the mask for dust protection. The masks are relatively inexpensive (around \$20) and they're available from several sources.
